

Castle Shannon is 100 Years Young

2019 has arrived and Castle Shannon Borough is officially turning 100!!! Although Castle Shannon was settled much earlier, it was not incorporated until 1919. To celebrate this milestone, there are some special events planned and some annual events being made "special."



On March 28th the historical Linden Grove hosted Castle Shannon Night with live music and buffet. All four bands had members that live in Castle Shannon, including Souly Noted, Evan Dean Band, Cellar Blues Band

Bearded Irishmen. The evening was lots of fun and, if you were not able to attend, you can catch these groups at Community Day and the Party on Park street events.





Community Day this year will feature more vendors, more children's activities, more food choices including food trucks, the four bands previously mentioned plus Pure Gold & Totally 80s, and an enhanced fireworks display.

In June, we will launch a self-guided Historical Walking Tour / Historical Scavenger Hunt. Maps will be available at the Borough Building, Library and various businesses in the downtown area.

There are 15 notable locations on the map and a few

other points of interest that you might want to check out. You will be "scavenging" for answers to questions about the sites that you visit. Each stop will have an informational sign explaining the significance of the location. On each sign will be a QR code to scan with a smart phone revealing the answer to a question about that site. For those wanting to participate in the scavenger hunt, question sheets will be available with the

events over the summer in the downtown area. Prizes will include 100th anniversary T-shirts and gift certificates from local merchants.

We are planning a retro golf outing at the Mt Lebanon golf course that was actually part of Castle Shannon one hundred years ago. Stay tuned!

Memo from the Mayor

Dear Resident,

During the recently concluded tax season, the Attorney General Josh Shapiro put out warnings about fraudulent calls and scams from criminals **impersonating IRS agents** and telling recipients that they need to send money right away, or risk arrest by the IRS.

This type of scam is nothing new, as scam artists use this and other ploys to get victims to release personal information and/or scare you into paying them thousands of dollars, usually by iTunes gift cards, PayPal cards or other electronic means.

An article from the National Council on Aging described other scams to watch out for in 2019: https://www.ncoa.org/blog/3-most-popular-scams-targeting-seniors/

- 1. **Social Security spoofing call-** The caller has technology to actually make the caller ID appear to come from the Social Security Administration (SSA). The actor will make some kind of threat that the recipient faces arrest or other legal action if they fail to follow instructions.
- 2. **Grandparent Scam** This oldie but goodie has been around for years, but the concept is that the caller pretends to be a relative/grandchild who has been involved in some kind of accident or legal trouble and needs money immediately.

The common themes in these scams are that the caller tells the victim not to tell anyone what they are doing, and they involve a transfer of large sums of money, usually through some type of gift card system. The caller/actor is counting on the fact that the victim is frightened and/or embarrassed and will not tell family members or engage law enforcement.

If you receive any calls, emails or mail that appear suspicious, please call police or at least review the materials or incident with a trusted member of your family.

Manager's Message

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ROUNDTABLE

On February 22, 2019, Representative Dan Miller's office hosted his annual Economic Development Roundtable. This event brings together leaders from all communities in Representative Miller's District to discuss key projects, make suggestions and provide insight into how best to help a project move forward.

Highlighted by remarks made from Dennis Davin, Secretary of the Department of Community and Economic Development with other guests from the Governor's Office, PennDot, Allegheny County and the Greater Pittsburgh Chamber of Commerce among others were on hand to help answer questions and provide suggestions on funding sources. Attending this event were: Mayor Baumgarten, Manager Thomas Hartswick and Keystone Community Coordinator Bettina Jones.



CASTLE SHANNON REDESIGNATED AS A **BANNER COMMUNITY**

In 2014, Castle Shannon was originally designated as a BANNER COMMUNITY by Allegheny County and the Allegheny League of Municipalities.

Castle Shannon has continued this designation and has been re-designated for the fifth year in a row as a Banner Community in 2019.

Designation requires an annual application for County consideration and indicates the Borough's commitment to and establishment of Benchmarking Good Governing Practices.

ACTIVE ALLEGHENY GRANT AND STUDY **PROGRAM**

In 2018, Castle Shannon was awarded a \$42,500 planning grant through the Redevelopment Authority of Allegheny County to fund a planning study exploring connectable and walkable pathways in the Myrtle Avenue neighborhood. An additional part of this activity will address how "new" Transit Oriented Developments Communities can be integrated into existing neighborhoods and how these diverse community groups can be linked to benefit each other. The planning activities addressed above were highlighted in our application for inclusion in the LIVE WELL ALLEGHENY CAMPAIGN.

A community "steering committee" will be established to help guide the consultants in the planning process and we invite all residents with comments on this matter to provide their input as this activity moves forward.

As part of the Borough's application material, we have strengthened Castle Shannon's commitment to "focus on continuing municipal trail connectivity, encouraging the use of multimodal transportation facilities, promoting policies to encourage walking and biking, and promoting volunteer engagement." This planning grant emphasizes these activities.

The LIVE WELL ALLEGHENY CAMPAIGN, initiated in



2014 by County Executive Fitzgerald, is a comprehensive strategy to help all county residents embrace physical, mental, personal, and community prevention and preparedness.

BLIGHTED PROPERTIES

Castle Shannon Building and Codes Official Paul Vietmeier continues to aggressively target "blighted properties" in the borough with assistance from Allegheny County through the South Hills Area Council of Governments (SHACOG).

Since 2012, we have successfully secured grant funding to demolish nine (9) vacant properties borough-wide. Each demolition can cost in excess of \$10,000.

In 2018, the Borough successfully removed two (2) vacant properties: 3236 May Street and 3473 McRoberts Road. Both properties were removed entirely through grant funding.

For 2019, three (3) properties are scheduled for demolition: 1214 Prospect, 1215 Prospect and 3750 Myrtle Avenue. Council strives to provide and deliver cost effective services Although a funding determination has not yet been received from Allegheny County, we anticipate this notice by next month.

All of the above lots are liened for the full cost of demolition and any back municipal taxes or fees.

Most lots cleared by demolition are buildable. Further information pertaining to zoning restrictions and building permits necessary can be obtained at the Municipal Offices. Liened amounts can be accessed at Allegheny Department of Economic Development 412-350-1000.

We work closely with property owners to attempt continual property upkeep and only when this proves to no avail move the property forward, to address maintenance conditions through the legal process.

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program has been a successful tool for Castle Shannon to address these types of projects; however, considerable concern has developed about the future of CDBG and other federally supported programs through HUD.



MUNICIPAL SEPARATE STORM SEWER SYSTEM OR **COMPLIANCE ACTIVITIES**

As we have previously mentioned, Castle Shannon, along with many other urbanized communities state and nationwide, operate and maintain storm sewer assets or MS4 operations.

In December 2017, Castle Shannon's current five (5) vear National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit, which began in 2013, expired.

Our new permit period is from 2018-2023.

As part of our renewal process, we are required to develop a plan that within five (5) years reduces approximately 360,000 pounds of sediment from our tributaries to Saw Mill Run Watershed.

Although plan specifics have not yet been determined, we envision that by restoring approximately 350 feet of stream bank, this requirement can be met.

Multiple options for this project are being reviewed and considered by Council along with our engineers.

When finalized, actual construction is tentatively scheduled to be initiated in 2021/22.

This project for this permit cycle has been estimated to cost between \$400K to \$500K.

In addition to finalizing the above referenced sediment removal project, we have continued our other compliance directives.


We have addressed Minimum Control Measures (MCM) I - "Public Education and Outreach" convening a "State of the Watershed-Saw Mill Run" program for all municipalities in the Saw Mill Run Watershed and developing a water shed presentation program with the Keystone Oaks School District.

Further, yearly inspections to assess compliance (all storm water inlets and piping structures) has recently been conducted by the Department of Public Works with repairs being scheduled when needed.

ADMINISTRATIVE CONSENT ORDER (ACO) WORK CONTINUES

Over ten (10) years ago, Castle Shannon and the other eighty plus (+80) communities in



To date, we have expended over \$7 million dollars to undertake the evaluation and correction of structural system deficiencies within our sanitary sewer system.

In 2019/20, we will enter the fourth year of a scheduled 10-year system wide repair program to maintain compliance with the ACO.

Currently, we have identified the Connor Road/South McCully Road sub-basin for rehabilitation activities which involve CCTV studies, installation of cured-in-place partial and full liners and general excavation work.

When finalized, this project is estimated to be in the \$420,000 cost range.

The Borough has applied for grant funding from ALCOSAN for \$367,000, which is approximately 85% of the total project costs.

Future projects to address overall structural segment deficiencies based on their severity level will require annual allocations of approximately equal amounts.

Additionally, EPA has or will be establishing new corrective mandates focusing on water quality issues such as the utilization of Green Technologies, Municipal Flow Targets, and possible new requirements for lateral inspections.

Further, federal regulators have stated they are expecting new levels of municipal sanitary sewer consolidation and regional cooperation.

As these federal mandates are put forth, we will strive to keep all informed.

We continue to keep our compliance costs as low as possible. Nearly 100% of all CCTV activities are done inhouse. Additionally, we continually look for opportunities in early project scheduling, joint-bidding and other areas

where municipal cooperation will minimize repair work

Due to the changing nature and the magnitude of this activity, the borough will provide compliance notices and other relevant information. It is my intention to provide annual updates, in the newsletter, on the progress we are making in our ACO work components.

In 2019/20, Castle Shannon will undertake a series of municipal improvement and maintenance projects to address community infrastructure and public facilities.

Borough Council strives to maintain a "hands-on" Finally, we hold mock assessment audits and conduct approach with these issues to ensure public input and involvement.

> Investments in the Borough's various infrastructure assets, which include Sanitary and Storm Sewer lines, (MS4) upgrades along with improvements to municipal recreation facilities, and all function in an inter-related process that improves the efficient provision of municipal services and address a community's environment, health and safety.

> Borough Council views the challenges posed by the continued maintenance and upgrades of our transportation and recreational assets as potential opportunities and is committed to their successful resolution.



Dear Reader,

I copied (stole) this definition off of Wikipedia-

"Crime Opportunity theory" suggests that offenders make rational choices and thus choose targets that offer a high reward with <u>little effort</u> and risk. The occurrence of a crime depends on two things: the presence of at least one motivated offender who is ready or willing to engage in a crime, and the <u>conditions of the</u> <u>environment</u> in which that offender is situated, to wit, opportunities for crime. A large part of this theory focuses on how variations in lifestyle or routine activities affect the opportunities for crime.



Opportunity thus becomes the limiting factor that determines the outcome in environments prone to crime, because the offender generally has little or no control over the conditions of the environment, and the conditions that permit particular crimes are often rare, unlikely or **preventable**."

If you've been following us on Social Media (twitter, Facebook, Instagram, ring/Neighbors or our website), you know that we have been sending notifications about thefts from UNLOCKED VEHICLES pretty frequently and consistently.

We made 5 arrests in the past year for thefts from UNLOCKED VEHICLES. 2 arrests were residents, but 3 of the actors traveled to our area specifically to commit these crimes of opportunity. The opportunity exists because we have become complacent. While we live and work in a relatively safe community, we all should still remain vigilant and diligent about common sense approaches to security and safety.

The Police Department continues to shoulder the heavy lifting for your safety, but we are stronger with your help. Please lock your vehicles and homes, especially when unattended, and as always, report suspicious people, vehicles and circumstances, by dialing 9-1-1. If you see something, SAY something, and if you have video surveillance of criminal activity, SHARE something.

PLEASE DO NOT FEED THE WILDLIFE

DON'T FEED THE WILDLIFE

Between rodent infestation, the deer population, and mosquitos, there are a lot of concerns on how to stop the rapid abundance of rodents, mosquitos, and ticks. Castle Shannon Borough is not alone - the problem is in every community.

The best-known way to stop any infestation is to **STOP FEEDING THE PESTS**. Rats and raccoons require the same three things as humans need to survive: food, water and shelter. Eighty percent of the rats and raccoons' diet is garbage and dog feces. Whenever rats and raccoons find a steady source of food, they move in. So, we should store garbage in sturdy cans with a tight-fitting lid.

Allegheny County and the PA Game Commission both agree that we should not feed the wildlife in the spring and summer because of all the vegetation that

surrounds us. Birds eating out of bird feeders are dropping food onto the ground, creating a food source for the rodents.

The deer are also going on property for food, bringing the ticks that will hide in high grass and weeds. According to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, Pennsylvania has more Lyme Disease cases than any other state in the nation – more than 73,000 since 2004. The blacklegged tick is the most dominant tick in Southwestern Pennsylvania.

The Asian Tiger Mosquito is becoming one of the most invasive in our area. Mosquitos only need a small amount of water to lay eggs. Bowls, cups, fountains, tires, barrels, vases, and any other container storing water make great "nurseries."

Some of the most prevalent diseases caused by mosquito bites are West Nile virus, Zika virus, Yellow Fever, Dengue Fever, Chikungunya virus.

Castle Shannon Borough adopted Ordinance 906 that prohibits the feeding of wild animals and provides penalties for violators. This ordinance mainly pertains to any edible matter that wild animals will consume on the ground or within the reach of wild animals.

It is very important to keep your property clean of rubbish, no dumping in easements and right of ways, controlling your garbage, removing your junk vehicles, which are a great home for the rodents, keeping your swimming pools clean, and removal of old tires and even the smallest item that can hold water.

Common Code Violations

The most common violations that are being committed in Castle Shannon Borough that you can face fines, penalties, or a \$25.00 ticket for each offense are as follows:

- High grass or weeds of 10 inches or higher
- Parking on grass
- Junk or inoperative vehicles
- Trailers, campers, boats in the front line of the house
- Garbage at the curb before 6:00 p.m. the night before pick-up or empty cans left at the curb after midnight of the pick-up day
- Litter, rubbish, garbage lying around the exterior of the property
- Gravel on the street

The most common zoning permits that are required are: sheds, fences, hot tubs, spas, swimming pools (especially 2-foot pools) and decks.








Over the past two years, there's been a lot of talk about REAL ID. Simply put, after October 1, 2020, people here in Pennsyl-vania and across the nation will not be able to board a domestic flight or enter a federal facility that requires identification, includ-ing a military base, unless they have identification that meets the REAL ID criteria set by the federal government.

Here in Pennsylvania, each person will choose whether or not to get a REAL



If you do decide that REAL ID is right for you, you will need to provide PennDOT with a set of required documents and pay a one -time REAL ID fee of \$30. You will also pay a driver's license renewal fee (\$30.50) at the same time. You don't need to wait until your license expires; you can get your REAL ID at any time. You will get credit for any time you had remaining on your old license plus the four years from the renewal, so you won't "lose" time that you already paid for. Your REAL ID compliant license



- **Proof of Identity** Original or certified copy of a birth certificate with a raised seal **OR** valid U.S. Passport
- Social Security card
- Two Proofs of Current, Physical Pennsylvania Address Current, unexpired PA license or ID AND a bank statement or utility bill with the same name and address that is no more than 90 days old
- Proof of all legal name changes Certified marriage record, court order or divorce decree from family court NOTE: if you are using an unexpired passport that reflects your current name as your form proof of identity, you do not need to provide these additional documents.

REAL ID's are now being issued. The Bridgeville PennDOT location is the only REAL ID center in the region, meaning that it can issue a same-day REAL ID. Other locations can accept the documents that are required for REAL ID for processing, and your REAL ID card will come in the mail within a few weeks.

A Reminder from Your Fire Department

A home fire can happen at any time. These tips can help you be prepared:

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, including the basement and outside all sleeping areas. This simple step cuts your family's risk of dying in a fire nearly in half. Test smoke alarms monthly, and change the batteries once a year or when the alarm chirps. Don't disable smoke alarms, even for a short time. Replace all smoke alarms every 10 years.

Install carbon monoxide detectors near sleeping areas. Be aware that carbon monoxide is a byproduct of smoke that can be deadly. It's a gas that you can't see, smell, or taste. Consider buying a combination smoke alarm/carbon monoxide detector.

Keep fire extinguishers in the home in accessible locations, especially in the kitchen. Check usage dates to make sure they are not expired.

If you live in an apartment, talk to your landlord about where smoke alarms are and how often they are tested. Also, ask about fire extinguisher locations and emergency exit routes.

POEMS

In addition to supporting, the Tree Vitalization Project, Home Town Heroes Banner Program, Community Day, a downtown Fall Festival and the Community Garden, we also are still offering a joint venture with the Emmanuel Lutheran Church known as Project Outreach Equipment and Medical Supplies or POEMS.

This program is free of charge and involves the loan of medical equipment such as wheelchairs, canes, walkers, and raised adult toilet

chairs among other items to residents needing assistance with short term or long term mobility issues.



Adding to this is the "Vials of Life" program. When a family member is being attended to in an emergency situation, sometimes vital medical

information can be forgotten or not available for the first responders

The Vials of Life promotes the idea of a written description of medicines and personal care physicians kept in a vial commonly located in an individual's refrigerator.

This information can be retrieved if an individual is unable to respond to assist with treatment provided by first responders.

- Downtown (from Martin's Auto Gallery to the Ice Castle, including businesses on Park, Poplar, Myrtle, and Willow Avenues.)
- Western (including all the shops on both sides of Mt. Lebanon Boulevard, including the Lebanon Shops and Shop'NSave.)
- 3. **Southern** (including all the shops on Library Rd/Route 88 between the intersection with Castle Shannon Boulevard and Stoner Centre.)

4. **Eastern** (including all the shops along Route 88/Library Rd. from Calabria's restaurant to Mindful Brewing and by the T-stations, as well as those on Grove Road.)

Remember, this map is the first of four we will create, along with an updated business directory to look out for in the fall newsletter.


