#### FROM THE MAYOR, DONALD BAUMGARTEN



It seems that whenever the news media writes or says anything about police it is a negative article or story.

The following is a copy of a police report from February 23rd, 2022:

"On 2-23-22 at 1721 hrs CSPD Officers were dispatched to a medical emergency at 300 Mt. Lebanon Blvd. The report was that a male was unconscious but breathing. Officer Recker was on scene in less than 2 minutes. He immediately assessed the patient and determined that he was not breathing and had no pulse.

Officer Recker started CPR and notified incoming units of the situation. Officer Platt arrived less than 3 minutes later, simultaneously with Chief Worth from MRTSA. Platt prepped the patient for AED use, applied defibrillator pads, and issued a shock when advised to by the device.

A Pulse was regained, and the patient was transported by the medics to the hospital. On 2-24-22 we were advised that the patient was doing well and expected to survive.

Chief Worth credits the Officers prompt response and quick actions for saving the patient's life."

On about the same time, a similar occurrence happened and again the officers who responded were able to keep him alive until the paramedics arrived.

I could tell you many more incidents like this, but my intent is to tell you how important that we have well trained officers who in many cases are the first responders.

# Welcome to the newest member of the hardest-working Public Works crew: the 3-Yard Combination Sewer Cleaner / Vacuum Truck, by Pipehunter Equipment.

Features of this truck include a 600 gallon stainless steel water tank, 3,000 cubic feet per minute vacuum blower, and a telescopic hydraulic boom with 250 degrees of range.

This specialized sewer cleaning machine jets water at high pressure into the manhole to flush out all debris lodged in sewer pipes. It is also used to suction water and debris out of the sewer pipes to prevent

system overloads. A less common use of the sewer cleaner / vacuum truck is for hazardous materials spills.

Most importantly, it means fewer in-person, in-sewer visits by our dedicated Public Works staff, which it seems they all appreciate.



#### Dear Constituents,



A few months ago, the City of Pittsburgh woke up to the news of the collapse of the Fern Hollow Bridge in the East End. The disruption caused by this event is

significant, well beyond the additional traffic and detours necessary to rebuild. While not all failures of government to provide and maintain public services are as obvious as a bridge collapse, the effect of even small errors is the same – an erosion of faith in the system.

Most citizens enjoy the fruits of effective government daily; our police are on the streets, our parks are manicured, our roads are safe, our library is open, our sanitary system works, the trash is collected, etc. A simple trip to the grocery store would validate that our local government is functional and working to the benefit of our community, and you wouldn't even know it...

...until you hit a pothole, or a water main break causes a street closure, or you receive an unwanted parking ticket. At that moment, local government goes from invisibly working well to visibly not working well for you. It is likely that you see frustrations like these expressed publicly on social media, adding to what can feel like cynicism towards government doing anything right.

But for all those individual moments when it seems government doesn't work well for you, my pledge as Council President is that the "invisible" good work of the borough will always outweigh the frustrating moments. We always strive to minimize or mitigate instances in which our constituents may feel burdened, but it is also our job to help the public see and understand the excellent quality of life we have here in Castle Shannon.

There are several significant ways that our borough will be enhanced in the coming years; we are proud of those efforts and investments, but I find most of my pride for this community in the smallness and subtlety of our everyday good service to our constituents. •

#### new Fire Chief - Chief Bill Reffner!

Some of you may be scratching your head right now, so to clarify: the outgoing Chief was Bill Reffner, Sr., while the incoming Chief is Bill Reffner, Jr. Bill Reffner, Jr. is also a lifelong Castle Shannon resident and has been with the Castle Shannon VFD since 1999. His nickname is, coincidentally, Junior.

Since joining the VFD, he has held numerous positions within the department including Firefighter, Engine Operator, Truck Operator, Lieutenant, Captain, Assistant Chief, and now Fire Chief. In addition, he has held many administrative positions within the organization including Treasurer, Board of Director, and President of the Relief Association.

The various duties of a fire chief are many, but the primary responsibility of the Fire Chief is to prevent the loss of life and property through rescue, fire suppression, training, and public education. This is achieved by overseeing and directing a safe, rapid, and effective response to all emergencies in the fire district; deliver the highest quality of trained, skilled, and caring professionals to each incident; maintain

the latest in vehicles, equipment, and firefighting techniques; promote fire prevention and safety through outreach and educational programming; and proactively reduce the risk from fire through the application and enforcement of Fire Codes and Investigations.

Chief Reffner reports that the biggest challenge all VFDs face is the recruitment and retention of members. Throughout the country, the volunteer fire service has seen a steady decline in membership in the past fifty years. In Pennsylvania alone, the fire service has gone from 300,000 members strong in the 70's, to only 38,000 members today.

He expressed his concerns by saying"... without a steady stream of new members, who's going to answer the call when your fire department is needed most? So, I ask the residents of Castle Shannon, come be a part of a dynamic organization and give back to your community. Our needs are great – from needing active firefighters, to those willing to help raise muchneeded funds, to those willing to support our administrative tasks – but the rewards are many. Call today, join YOUR fire department, and make

a meaningful difference for your family, your neighbors, and your community."

What is Chief Reffner's favorite part of the position, thus far?"Overall, this is an exciting time to be in a leadership role in the fire department. As we celebrate our 100th Anniversary with an Open House on May 22nd from 12 pm – 4 pm, the organization just accepted our new strategic plan with a renewed focus on recruitment of new members, enhanced firefighter training, and the purchase of a new Engine that when delivered in late 2023 will serve our community for the next quarter century.

Personally, I look forward to following in my father's footsteps. After fifty years of faithful service, my dad just retired as Fire Chief and there was no greater honor than at his retirement ceremony, he presented me with his Chief's badge. I will wear it with pride and continue his legacy of serving this department – and this community – with integrity, empathy, and humility."



# 100 Years of Dedicated Service

Within two years after the new Borough of Castle Shannon was carved from the Baldwin Township borders, a dedicated group of citizens laid the groundwork for an organized firefighting force. In March of 1922, this new citizens' group elected temporary officers and began to seek out members and personnel from this new town. 140 men and women paid \$1.00 to be considered for membership in what would evolve into the Castle Shannon Volunteer Fire Department. One month later, the fledgling fire department had 45 firefighters and new officers were elected to formal, term-limited positions. Among this new membership were well-known Castle Shannon names: Laughlin, Schenot, Vitte, Waterman, and many more. By the summer of 1922, a new Howe/REO firetruck was ordered and by the fall was delivered. This first vehicle was motorized and painted red; the firetruck color would not be corrected to green until 1946, when a new, Kelly green Amrens-Fox pumper was delivered. Castle Shannon's green

trucks have henceforth been known as "The Green Hornet."

Ed Laughlin provided an outbuilding of his funeral home to house the truck and gear. Mrs. Mary Schenot lent her office at Schenot's Hotel (now the empty lot next to Laughlin Memorial Chapel) as a meeting room and supplied an incoming phone line to accept emergency calls. Eventually, a siren was placed there as well, to sound out fire calls.

This initial year also saw the Fire Department's first automobile raffle, with tickets being sold to benefit this new fire company. On Labor Day, a 1922 Chevrolet was raffled from an outdoor event held by the Department at Grove Station, now the Linden Grove area. This event was the precursor to what would become our Summer Carnival.


A portion of the McKee property in the triangle of Park and Myrtle Avenues and Castle Shannon Boulevard was acquired, and in 1939 the new, permanent firehouse was completed. The Fire Department was housed here until


1979, when the station on Library Road was completed.



# PERMANENT GLASS RECYCLING STATION NOW AVAILABLE IN CASTLE SHANNON BOROUGH

Castle Shannon Borough residents can now conveniently recycle glass bottles, jars and jugs following the installation of a permanent recycling dumpster in the Castle Shannon Fire Department lot.

Since December of 2021, residents of the Castle Shannon and surrounding municipalities have been dropping off all colors of glass bottles, jars and jugs thanks to a partnership between Castle Shannon Borough and the Pennsylvania Resources Council (PRC) that provides reliable, uninterrupted glass recycling access.

"Residents of Castle Shannon are interested in recycling glass even when it isn't collected curbside, and we're excited to make this opportunity available every day of the week," according to Borough Manager Katie Stringent. "With the help of PRC, the borough has set up a permanent glass recycling station and will implement a campaign to educate residents regarding glass recycling and other waste reduction activities."

The blue recycling dumpster is located in the Castle Shannon Fire Department lot (3600 Library Rd., 15234) and will be available for self-serve drop off during daylight hours seven days a week. Individuals can drop off glass bottles, jars and jugs of all colors (no sorting

required). Containers should be empty and rinsed, with lids and labels still on. Bags and boxes used to deliver glass must be discarded off-site.

"Glass is still one of the most recyclable materials we generate in our homes, and the market for glass recycling is very strong," according to Ashley DiGregorio, PRC Recycling Markets and Grants Manager. "It's important from an environmental perspective to keep glass out of landfills, and PRC is dedicated to building an efficient, region-wide glass recycling collection network with partners such as Castle Shannon Borough."

The Castle Shannon permanent recycling site is sponsored by Castle Shannon Borough and is made possible through program sponsorship from Owens-Illinois, Inc. and CAP Glass in partnership with Michael Brothers Hauling & Recycling.

"Reasons for recycling glass include the fact that glass can be recycled endlessly, and recycling glass requires 70 percent less energy than when manufacturing glass from raw materials," said Di-Gregorio. "Studies show that 90% of consumers believe glass recycling is important, and the success PRC has experienced with its existing program definitely shows that people want to recycle glass whenever possible."

This is my sixteenth year as the Code
Official and in the past year and a half I have
noticed a lot of younger residents buying homes.

#### This is great in so many ways!

It is nice to see homes getting a makeover. House flippers are renovating damaged homes, including two condemned houses that were scheduled to be demolished. Most of these homes are being turned into rental property.

Unfortunately, the downfall to this is that it keeps me busy with the many ordinances that residents are unaware of. New (and existing) residents are surprised that you are not allowed to have trailers, campers/RVs or vehicles over one ton parked in the front of your house.

The most common violation keeping me busy pertains to the rodent population. It is a toss-up between the garbage or the feeding of birds and animals. Weekly garbage should be placed at the curb no earlier than 6:00 p.m. the night before pickup and empty cans should be removed by midnight the night of pickup. Animals get into garbage bags and what they don't eat is left scattered in yards and streets. As far as feeding the animals and birds, I cannot get over how fast the rats show up. We've even had a call that a resident could not get out of their house because of wild turkeys. Not to mention the reports of turkeys pecking at cars, especially shiny, dark-colored cars.

Let's not forget the parking of vehicles on grass. This causes mud to be dragged onto our streets which affects the storm sewers. Stagnant water can develop in the deep ruts left in yards creating a breeding ground for mosquitoes that could lead to West Nile virus.

This spring the Borough will be launching a 311 Citizen Request Management (CRM) app for both Android and iPhone devices.



With a focus on boosting citizen engagement, trust, and satisfaction the Borough has made the determination to offer the 311 app as a tool to allow you, the resident, business owner, and visitor to engage directly with the Borough without the need to ever pick up the phone. By downloading the 311 app entitled "Castle Shannon Cares" you will be directly connected to Borough staff who will be able to address your property concern, pot hole in the roadway, or refuse and recycling issue digitally.

Once your request has been submitted, it will be directly routed to the correct department or employee, based on pre-set request categories with a required response due in a pre-determined amount of time ensuring your request is addressed promptly. You will actively be able to monitor your request progress every step of the way until completion without any necessary phone calls, walk-ins, or manual follow-ups with the Borough.

Implementing the 311 Castle Shannon Cares app, is an excellent way to allow residents and Borough officials to work together to improve their shared quality of life. Castle Shannon Cares will help Borough staff acknowledge concerns quickly, alert users when their issue is resolved, prioritize your inquiry based on the nature of the request, and better manage Borough resources. As a result, your requests, concerns, and issues will be heard quickly, acknowledged, and resolved without ever having to leave your living room.

With the launch of Castle Shannon Cares residents can be actively engaged with Borough staff, report issues impacting your day, and efficiently seek resolution. The Castle Shannon Cares app is available for download on both Android and iPhone devices in the App Store.

Be sure to mark your calendars for our signature event, the **Annual Disability** & Mental Health Summit! This event has become

the largest collection of disability and mental health resources in southwestern Pennsylvania, and it's back with an all-new format for 2022. Rather than taking place in a single week, this year's Summit will involve a series of events spread across the springtime months.

This past March, we kicked off with our Legislative Panel, where legislators from both chambers of the legislature and both sides of the aisle gathered to discuss critical issues impacting people with disabilities. Experts, advocates and families who have been impacted by the direct support professional workforce crisis and the need for a more robust mental health system shared their perspectives and answered questions

about their experiences. We are hopeful that the legislators who attended will take their insights back to Harrisburg and work to improve the situation.

We will return to our traditional host location, Beth El Congregation in Scott Township, on April 28th. Our keynote speaker that day will be Michael Gamel-McCormick, Senator Bob Casey's Disability Policy Director, who will share an update on federal disability initiatives. Five sessions will follow that, with topics ranging from supporting those at risk of suicide to planning for college with a disability. #### **GRILLING SAFETY** Reminders from the CSVFD

By the time this newsletter reaches your household many of you are making plans for spring and summer activities, many of which include outdoor grilling. It is not unusual for the Castle Shannon Volunteer Fire Department to respond to a call involving a gas grill mishap during the grilling season. Fortunately, most of these mishaps involve little personal injury or property loss.

First responders including EMS, fire, and police periodically conduct review of procedures to be prepared when emergencies arise. You, as the griller also should review the safety guidelines



related to outdoor grilling to help prevent such emergencies or know what to do when such an emergency occurs.

Your best source of information on the proper use and safe operation is in your "OWNERS GUIDE" which should be included when you purchase a gas grill. If you do not have this information, vou should be able to obtain such information by contacting the manufacturer. Review this information to fully understand how a propane gas grill operates. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) has a nice single page article on basic safety grilling tips for both propane and charcoal grills.

Be sure the grill is assembled properly. If not sure contact the retail dealer you purchased the grill from or manufacturer for assistance.

Secure a safe place away from structure, at least 10 feet, and place on a flat, level surface. Do not use under porches or on your apartment's balcony. The use of grills on balconies most likely is governed by the building owner and or by the municipality in which you reside. Never grill indoors.

Before using your gas grill check that all the gas connections are properly secured.

Keep children and pets away when grill is in use.

Keep your grill clean. A buildup of grease from the grill and in the tray below will create a hazard.

Have the proper type of fire extinguisher available. ABC type is preferred.

Among the most important things to remember is to be prepared for an emergency. If a physical injury occurs or a propane grill malfunctions and you are not sure what to do, IMMEDIATELY CALL 911 FOR HELP.

# **CASTLE SHANNON NAMED** A 2022 **BANNER** COMMUNITY



The Borough of Castle Shannon has been recognized as a 2022 Banner Community by County Executive Rich Fitzgerald and the Allegheny League of Municipalities (ALOM).

- Conduct an effective Citizen Communication Program by offering a municipal newsletter or web-based communication effort, and participate in a class discussion on local government or conducting a shadowing program for junior or senior high school students
- Promote and implement long term sustainable governing practices by earning certification through Sustainable Pittsburgh, managing employee pensions at funding levels of 90% or above, participating in the annual ALOM Wage and Salary Survey Program, and implementing goals of an up to date Municipal Comprehensive Plan 👼
