highlight projects for 2023. Throughout the last year, many exciting changes have taken place within the Borough not the least of which the improvements within the downtown business district. As I am certain you have noticed, we had a flurry of activity within our downtown throughout this construction season. While the construction resulted in detours and delays, the final project is one that is truly unmatched. I am most excited to see the changes and improvements within our business district. The improvements focus on making our downtown walkable, safe, and welcoming. Through road closed signs, orange traffic cones, and flaggers our downtown businesses remained opened for business.

The downtown Streetscape project was only the first step in our downtown revitalization efforts. While our downtown has seen a major aesthetic improvement, I encourage our residents and visitors to truly shop small. Your support within our business district is

vital to the ongoing success of the community. Make time to visit our businesses, dine within our restaurants, and become a familiar face on Willow Avenue.

Please note while visiting downtown, should you see an issue with the streetlights, benches, or waste receptacles let the Borough know using our 311 Castle Shannon Cares App. The app is designed to let you notify the Borough of issues or concerns without having to email or phone the Borough. Download the app today in the Apple or Google Play store.

2023 continues to bring new and exciting opportunities to the Borough. As highlighted in Council President Heckmann's article the Borough will be kicking off construction of the Six Parks"Plus"Master Plan. The Plan will upgrade the Borough's recreational facilities allowing for more play opportunities and enhanced features such as a splash park in Upper Hamilton. The ability to embark on such improvements and bring continued upgrades to the community is a function of the Borough's strong financial position. The health of the Borough finances reflects strong fiscal management and appropriate direction from Borough Council. Projects such as the downtown Streetscape and the execution of the Parks Master Plan demonstrate clearly thought-out planning, impact consideration, and long-term maintenance considerations all of which are possible only due to strict financial management.

As change comes with seasons, you will continue to notice changes with the Borough. The constant forefront of all change is the improvement for those that live, work, and play in Castle Shannon.

When I travel around Pittsburgh or the country generally, I try to notice the small things about communities

that show that they care. Are all the streetlights working? Do the curbs have fresh paint? How new are the police cars and public works vehicles?

In Castle Shannon, we have spent the last few years focusing on improving the big and small details of our neighborhood. With our downtown Streetscape project wrapping up this fall, we are turning our attention to improving some of the greatest assets we have here – our parks.

This year, Borough Council authorized a once-in-a-generation investment in our parks and library system. By taking advantage of a favorable bond environment and our many years of solid fiscal management, we approved a \$5.6MM investment in our recreational assets without raising taxes.

What does this look like? Well, here's a partial list of what you can expect over the next few years:

- Our parks will receive new playground equipment, aesthetic improvements, public artwork and other necessary infrastructure improvements (drainage, shade trees, retaining walls, etc.).
- Lower Hamilton Park will be converted into a turf field, allowing for more uses and less weather dependency on that space. A brand-new recreation building with a stage, kitchen and seating will be built to replace the aging shelter and kitchen.

- Upper Hamilton Park will have a large splash pad installed along with sizable, accessible playground equipment.
- Riehl Park will soon have a deck hockey court built along with new shaded seating throughout.
- Municipal Field will have new playground equipment, embedded hillside seating for viewing games, an expanding snack stand platform and expanding parking.
- Our library will receive significant signage, lighting, façade and landscaping improvements.

I take great pride in the history, condition and stewardship of our community. I hope each resident feels that same sense of pride as they see these wonderful investments shape our future together.

FROM THE FIRE CHIEF BILL REFFNER



As we move from summer into the fall season, it is time to remind all residents to do some of the simple things to help keep you and your family safe as the winter months approach. Take the following tips and apply them to your household or place of business.

SMOKE DETECTORS

Smoke detectors are the first line of defense to protect you and your family from a house fire. These devices, when in good working order, will provide the early warning needed to safely escape injury or even death.

Know how your smoke detector works.

Read the information that comes with the unit. Most importantly, know the difference between the low battery alert and the actual alarm when the unit detects smoke. The low battery alarm is likely a "CHIRPING" sound. This chirping will continue until the battery is replaced. The "ALARM" sound is the sound you hear when you conduct your monthly test.

Test your smoke detector monthly.

- Install new batteries immediately when the low battery warning (CHIRP) sounds or once a year.
- Clean your smoke detector on a regular basis by vacuuming it with the brush attachment.

Replace your detector every 10 years.

Educate your children on the purpose of the smoke detector, how they work and what to do when the alarm sounds.

Follow the recommendations that accompanies the smoke detector related to the number and placement of smoke detectors for your household.

CARBON MONOXIDE **DETECTOR**

Just like smoke detectors, carbon monoxide detectors (more commonly known as CO detectors) are early warning devices that can guard you and your

family against carbon monoxide poisoning. Why should you have a carbon monoxide detector in your home? Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless, and tasteless gas that is poisonous to humans, as well as family pets. This gas can affect you without you knowing what is happening to you. Do not take CO lightly, it can kill.

Some sources of CO are the fireplace and chimney, gas dryer, gas range and furnace. This is a great time of year to check these items to make sure they are in good operating order before winter sets in.

We recommend you do some research on how CO detectors work, types of units that are available on the market, and number of units needed for vour household.

You should be familiar with general guidelines on how both of these devices work and the possible affects smoke, fire, and CO can have on you and your family. If you are not sure what to do or need assistance regarding these devices, never hesitate to call on the volunteers of the Castle Shannon Fire Department. 💏



To the Residents and Business Owners of Castle Shannon,

In the month of November, you will be receiving the annual donation request from the Castle Shannon Volunteer Fire Department. The funds that you graciously provide help dedicated men and women of the Castle Shannon Volunteer Fire Department to continue to do our job of providing fire protection for the community of Castle Shannon.

You may ask: why is the fire department requesting my help? There are two answers to that question.

First, while we do receive funds from the Borough, the fire department relies almost entirely on the efforts of our members to raise money through the various fundraisers we conduct throughout the year. The time spent on these fundraising efforts is over and above the time that is required for continuous training and responding to all types of emergencies. While these fundraisers help fund the fire department, they do not cover all our needs. That is why we rely upon your help.

Secondly, just like your home, apartment building or business, our buildings and equipment need to be maintained. Several years ago, for example, the department had the roof replaced on the station house at a cost of approximately \$90,000.00. Earlier this year, the department spent \$40,000.00 for asphalt replacement, seal coating the front of the station, and line painting of the entire parking lot. We think you would all agree that these are large expenses for an organization that

your personal vehicle, this equipment needs constant maintenance to be ready when needed.

The members of the Castle Shannon Volunteer Fire Department sincerely thank you for your past support, and request that you consider donating again - any amount that you can afford will be greatly appreciated.





Recognizing the service of our first responders is one thing; acting to help them is another. Firefighters selflessly protect people and

property, which is why I would like to highlight a bill I recently authored. My bill is designed to provide help to every firefighter – including those who faithfully serve the residents of Castle Shannon.

The fire service is dangerous work, and, while many line-of-duty deaths and injuries relate to that work directly, many others develop after the work is done. The link to cancer and heart-related disease in firefighters is clear, and, unfortunately, we lose far too many to suicide.

In many cases, those lives could have been extended or saved entirely with early detection and prevention measures. Because of the heightened risks to their members, some fire companies require annual physical examinations that include stress tests and preventative health exams to try to catch diseases early. Where they have been implemented, these programs have been proven to save lives.

Unfortunately, for too many departments across Pennsylvania, this is not the case. These exams typically run around \$500-600 per firefighter, and this cost can present a financial barrier that prevents firefighters from protecting themselves.

That is why I introduced HB 1853, Connecting Firefighters with Preventive Physical and Mental Healthcare, along with my colleague Rep. Jennifer O'Mara. This legislation would provide a new grant pathway for fire companies that choose to require annual physical examinations, providing up to \$650 of coverage for each firefighter who complies with the requirements.

This bill would preserve personal medical privacy, assure collective bargaining rights, and would be available for every firefighter in every department that answers at least 15 calls a year. To be eligible, fire companies would need

to certify that each firefighter receives, on an annual basis, a minimum of two hours of mental health training specifically focused on identifying and discussing the impact that fire service trauma may have on them and their brothers and sisters with whom they serve.

Evidence shows a direct relationship between firefighters' service and their greater risk for long-term health challenges. Cost should never be a barrier to a firefighter getting the preventative healthcare they need, and being able to afford such an exam should never be dependent on individual or departmental fundraising. They have our back, and we should have theirs.

Jeremy Hepple!




Jeremy comes to us from Charleroi where he also worked in code enforcement. He is a volunteer

Leaf Waste can be placed at the curb no earlier than 6:00 p.m. on the day before pickup in biodegradable paper bags.






Hello! My name is Heather Myrah. Many of you know me but I would like to reintroduce myself. I started my library career at the Brentwood


