Convey911 facilitates seamless and bi-directional communication through text messaging and video. It allows our Borough Office and Police Department staff to engage with complainants of non-emergency situations.

This breakthrough technology eliminates any burden on our citizens to purchase an app or sign up for the service. Through the user-friendly Convey911 interface used by our employees, citizens gain the ability to respond to text messages effortlessly. With support for real-time bi-directional language translation in nearly 200 languages, individuals can now communicate with us in their native language. Convey911 supports streamlined communication during non-emergency incidents.

Convey911 has been successfully implemented by our Communications Staff, enabling effective communication between our agency and citizens during non-emergency and administrative calls. # From the Fire Chief: Bill Reffner







As the Fall and Winter Months quickly approach with shorter days and the colder temperatures, I immediately start thinking about making soup, the holiday baking, hosting Steeler game parties, and Sunday dinners. This got me thinking about this year's fall Newsletter Article - the Theme for this year's Fire Prevention Week is "Cooking Safety Starts with YOU!" which runs from October 8-14, 2023.

#### PRACTICE SAFE COOKING

- Never leave your stove unattended while cooking.
   Stay in the kitchen while you're frying, grilling, boiling or broiling food. If you have to leave the room—even for just a moment—turn off the stove.
- Keep your cooking area free of combustible materials. Keep anything that can catch fire, such as food packaging, oven mitts and towels, away from your stovetop.
- Create a kid-free zone. Create a space of at least three feet around your stove and other areas where hot food is prepared.
- Turn pot handles toward the back of the stove. This way, they can't be bumped into and children can't grab them.
- Keep a fire extinguisher nearby. Make sure you have the correct type of extinguisher and know how to properly use it.
- Keep cooking equipment clean. Crumbs in a toaster, built-up grease on the stovetop, and excess dust behind your appliances are fire hazards.
- Wear short, close-fitting, or tightly rolled sleeves.
   Loose clothing can catch fire if it comes in contact with a gas flame or electric burner.
- Long Hair. If you have longer hair be sure to have it pulled/tied back or kept under a hat while cooking near gas stoves.
- Never throw hot grease in the garbage. Let grease cool before disposing of it in the garbage. Never pour grease or oil down the drain.
- Avoid using kitchen appliances if you're sleepy or have consumed alcohol.

#### IN CASE OF A FIRE

By practicing safe cooking in the kitchen, you can help reduce the risk of fire or injury. If a fire does occur, it's important to be prepared.

- Your safety comes first. If you cannot safely extinguish a fire, get outside quickly, close the door behind you to contain the fire, and call 9-1-1.
- Smother grease fires. To smother a small grease fire, slide a lid over the pan, turn off the stovetop, and leave the pan covered until it's completely cooled.
- Keep oven and microwave fires contained. Turn off the heat and keep the door closed until the flames are completely out.




According to <a href="www.NFPA.com">www.NFPA.com</a>, cooking equipment is the leading cause of home fires and fire injuries, causing 49% of home fires that resulted in 21% of the home fire deaths and 45% of the injuries. # From Representative Miller:

Today in the United States, the Alzheimer's Association estimates that about 1 in 9 people - 6.7 million Americans - age 65 and older are living with Alzheimer's Disease. By the time people are 85 or older, a third will have developed Alzheimer's. As the number of seniors in the U.S. continues to increase, so too will the number who are living with this disease. In fact, barring breakthroughs in prevention or treatment, the number of Americans with Alzheimer's could grow to 12.7 million by 2050 and 13.8 million by 2060.



While the numbers alone are staggering, they only tell part of the story. Alzheimer's, like other serious illnesses, impacts not just the person with the disease, but also their loved ones. With Alzheimer's, though, the impact can be particularly devastating, robbing the individual who is ill of the knowledge of who they are – and the knowledge of who the person is that is sitting by their side and holding their hand. Its effects impact minds, bodies, relationships, finances, families – virtually every aspect of life. But there is reason for hope, as research continues to lead us to new understandings and new treatment possibilities.

That is why I am hosting an event called Understanding, Treating, and Preventing Alzheimer's Disease at the Castle Shannon Library at 7 p.m. on Thursday, October 26th. Our speakers at this event are both local experts on Alzheimer's Disease. Dr. Jennifer Lingler, Director of Outreach, Recruitment, and Education at the University of Pittsburgh's Alzheimer's Disease Research Center, and Sara Murphy, Vice President of Programs and Services at the Greater Pennsylvania Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association, will share information and answer questions about Alzheimer's Disease and other forms of dementia. They will talk about the importance of early identification, discuss newly approved treatment options, share information about what we can all do to reduce our lifetime risk of developing Alzheimer's, and talk about supports and services for individuals with the disease and their loved ones.

If you are concerned about how Alzheimer's disease might impact your life or the life of someone you love, now or at some point in the future, I hope that you will join us for this special event on Thursday, October 26th. The event is free to attend, and no preregistration is required. If you have questions or are looking for information, this will be a great place to find some answers!



# **Planning & Codes:**

As the beautiful colors of autumn take over, leaves float down from trees, creating a lovely fall scene. However, beneath the beauty lies a potential problem for storm sewers. Fall leaves, though charming, can pose challenges to our infrastructure and the environment. Fall leaves can impact our storm sewers and cause many problems.

One of the primary concerns with fall leaves is their tendency to clog storm drains. As leaves accumulate on streets and sidewalks, they can be washed into storm sewers during rainfall. When these leaves block storm drains, it hampers the flow of water, potentially leading to localized flooding.

The decomposition of fallen leaves can also have a detrimental effect on water quality. As leaves break down, they release organic matter and nutrients, such as phosphorus and nitrogen, into stormwater runoff. These pollutants can find their way into local water bodies, contributing to water quality issues like algal blooms and oxygen depletion.

While fall leaves add charm to the autumn season, they can have a significant impact on storm sewers if not managed effectively. The accumulation of leaves in storm sewers can lead to blockages, which can be time-consuming and expensive to address. To help address this, please take proactive steps to help keep yards and streets free of leaves. There is leaf collection during October and November, and we encourage you to participate.

Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4s) are collection systems designed to transport rainwater and snow melt through a series of drains, pipes, ditches and open channels to our streams and rivers. The water that flows into the storm sewer system is called stormwater runoff. Before entering the system, it becomes contaminated by oil and grease from roadways, pesticides from lawns, sediment from construction sites, and carelessly discarded trash, such as cigarette butts, paper wrappers and plastic bottles.

In a separate storm sewer system, stormwater runoff is not treated; therefore, all of the pollutants it carries flow directly into our waterways, where they can contaminate drinking water supplies and interfere with the habitat for fish and other aquatic organisms.

To prevent harmful pollutants from being washed or dumped into MS4s, certain operators are required to obtain NPDES permits and develop stormwater management programs (SWMPs). The SWMP describes the stormwater control practices that will be implemented consistent with permit requirements to minimize the discharge of pollutants from the sewer system. Castle Shannon Borough was issued a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Permit through the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PADEP) and the Environmental Protection Agency.

Implemented through the Clean Water Act, the permit's numerous requirements are through six Minimum Control Measures (MCMs). These six MCMs consist of the following:

- Public Education and Outreach Distribute educational materials and conduct outreach to inform citizens about the impacts that stormwater runoff has on water quality.
- Public Involvement/Participation Provide opportunities for residents to participate in the stormwater management program or other programs which improve water quality.
- Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination Develop and implement a plan to detect and eliminate non-stormwater discharges into the stormwater system.
- Construction Site Runoff Control Develop, implement and enforce an erosion and sediment control program for construction site activities that disturb one acre or greater.
- Post Construction Site Runoff Control –
   Develop, implement and enforce a program
   to address discharges of post-construction
   stormwater runoff from new development
   or redevelopment areas.
- Pollution Prevention/Good Housekeeping Develop and implement a program that reduces or prevents pollutant runoff from municipal operations.





# Parks Plus Plan Construction Updates




The Parks Plus Plan is well under way, and we're incredibly excited to have the first phase completed! The Parks Plus Plan is a comprehensive update for all of the Borough parks and public gathering spaces, with new construction, play equipment, and field updates.



Group 1 Projects consist of Prospect Park, Myrtle Park, and the Community Library of Castle Shannon. Both Myrtle and Prospect Parks received some new play equipment, more benches and seating, and updated pavilions/shelters. The Library has a new concrete and stone entrance walkway that provides seating areas for readers who want to sit outside. Shade sails have also been installed, offering shaded grass areas to lounge and read. Stop by the parks or Library and check out the new amenities, and enjoy some time outside before winter comes!



Group 2 of the Parks Plus Plan includes Lower and Rear Hamilton Park. Construction is underway, and on track to be completed in late May of 2024. The grass field and baseball field will be re-turfed, creating a seamless transition between baseball and soccer fields, as well as giving a safer level playing surface. A new pavilion is being constructed, with updated amenities including bathrooms and kitchen appliances. Rear Hamilton Park will also be resurfaced along the basketball court.





Group 3 of the Parks Plus Plan includes Upper and Mid Hamilton. These areas are slated for a 2024 construction period, and will include new pavilion/shelter areas, new play equipment, and updated amenities such as bathrooms and kitchen appliances. Upper Hamilton will also be receiving a Splash Pad along with new play equipment!
