### A word about Solicitation . . .

Our Borough Ordinance #905 states . . . No person shall engage in any transient retail business within the Borough of Castle Shannon without first having obtained from the Borough a license . . . at the expiration of any license . . . shall be required to file a new application . . .

This does NOT include . . . religious proselytizing, political speech, and the distribution of handbills . . . selling their own produce . . . the proceeds are applied to any charitable or philanthropic purpose . . .bread or bakery products, meat products, milk products . . .children under the age of eighteen (18) for newspapers, greeting cards, candy, bakery products or who represent the Boy Scouts or Girl Scouts or similar organizations . . . funds for Charitable Purposes Act . . .

The complete ordinance can be viewed at the Municipal Center and/or copied for .25 cents a page.

If you do not invite solicitors to your home and/or want to prevent such visitors, there are ways to be proactive - go to csboro.com and under the Forms tab you will see "DO NOT SOLICIT FORM". Complete



this form entirely and you will automatically be put onto our list that is given to any solicitors within Castle Shannon Borough. ONLY your address is given to the solicitors that have already completed a process through the police department background checks and receive their Solicitor's License. This license MUST be carried with the solicitor at all times.

There are also signs that you can acquire on-line at <a href="https://">https://</a> allegheny.crimewatchpa.com/cspd/24171/post/no-solicitors-list to print your own sign to place on your door or window. Signs are also available for pick-up at the police department.

Should a solicitor come to your door, you should say - 'May I please see your Solicitor's Permit?' If they cannot produce a completed/signed permit with their color photo you should call 9-1-1 to report this solicitor.

### From the Fire Chief

It's that time of year again! Spring is here, and it's time to clean out all that clutter that has accumulated over the winter months. Longer days and warmer temperatures will give people more time to spend outside with family and friends. To make this spring safe and enjoyable, here are a few things we can do to get started:

- Go through your home room by room and thoroughly clean each of them. Rooms don't have to be done all at once.
- Set up a schedule and then stick to it. Get rid of unneeded and unwanted items.
- · Have a yard sale or donate them to local charities such Goodwill or Society of St Vincent DePaul.
- Garage items such as household cleaners, chemicals or paint must be properly disposed of. The Allegheny County
  and The Pennsylvania Resource Council websites are good resources to check out for local upcoming Chemical Drop
  Off events and locations.

Rule of Thumb - If you have haven't used in over a year you likely don't need it!

Here's a quick checklist to make things go smoothly for springtime fun.

- Use barbecue grills, smokers outside only and at a minimum of 10 feet from your home or apartment and please do not use under overhangs or balconies and away from combustibles. Grills should never be left unattended.
- Dispose of smoking materials and charcoal properly.
- · Never fill a hot engine with gasoline.
- · Blow out candles before leaving a room.
- Practice a home escape plan and make sure all exit doors open easily for fast escapes.
- Change batteries in smoke alarms, flashlights, and carbon monoxide detectors.
- Never borrow smoke alarm batteries to use for toys or other equipment.
- Replace all smoke alarms every 10 years or as recommended by the manufacturer.
- Keep outdoor debris or dead vegetation away from your home.

- Properly dispose of oily or greasy rags. If these items must be stored, they should be kept in labeled, sealed, metal containers.
- Clean your garage of stored newspapers or other rubbish that can fuel a fire. Newspapers stored in damp or warm places may ignite spontaneously.
- If you store gasoline, keep it outside your home in a shed or detached garage. Keep only small quantities in tightly sealed containers. Use gasoline only as a motor fuel - never as a cleaning agent.
- Check fire extinguishers for serviceability monthly. Replace unit if they are older than 10 years old. Traditional fire extinguishers generally have a 10-12 year life expectancy.
- Add a Small Fire Blanket for fire extinguishment under the kitchen sink, garage, shed, and under the grill. They are simple to use and less messy.
- · Replace cracked or broken outlet covers.

We are excited to announce that our 11th Annual Disability & Mental Health Summit is coming up on April 18th and 19th, back to two full days of events and resources for self-advocates, supportive families, and professionals alike!

Our biggest summit in years finds us returning to our home at Beth El Congregation of the South Hills at 1900 Cochran Road in Scott Township. This year's summit will feature over 20 free informational sessions over the two days, as well as resource fairs, bipartisan legislative panels, and special guest speakers on both days of the event. Some of the breakout sessions you can attend this year include "The Loneliness Epidemic: Embracing the Power of Social Connection;" Your Child's First IEP;" and "Supporting the Mental Health Needs of Veterans." Continuing education credits will once again be available for teachers, lawyers, rehab counselors, and social workers and other related professionals. You can find details about continuing ed on the Sessions tab at DisabilitySummit.com.

We also want to highlight our new Thursday evening programming. First, we will be hosting a Festiv-ALL from 4 to 6 p.m. featuring art and music created by local artists from our disability and mental health community. This will be followed by a special panel of students and parents sharing their insights about the school-to-adult transition process beginning at 5:30 p.m.

Finally, from 6 to 8 p.m., we will be hosting a Futures Fair in partnership with Keystone Oaks School District and other local districts. The Futures Fair will give transition-age students with disabilities and mental health diagnoses an opportunity to connect with resources tailored to their unique transition journeys, including education, employment, social/recreational opportunities, and support services.

The Summit is, as always, free to attend. Walk-ins are welcome on the day of the event, but we encourage you to pre-register at DisabilitySummit.com to ensure that you have a seat at the sessions you are most interested in. We hope to see you there.

While progress has been made on some fronts regarding the lives and opportunities for people with disabilities and mental health challenges, we still have a long way to go to make sure that acceptance, success, happiness, and independence are a reality for everyone. ### Youth Association

The Castle Shannon Youth Association set up 3 indoor workout sessions for both the male and female athletes throughout February and March to prep us for our upcoming spring session. Our time at D-Bat was an enriching experience that catered to players of all ages and skill levels, from 8U to 15U softball and pony baseball. Each aspect of our training program, whether it was hitting, fielding, pitching, or agility and strength development, was thoughtfully tailored to meet the unique needs of players across this wide age range.

For our youngest athletes in the 8U age group, the focus was on laying down a solid foundation of fundamental skills. Coaches employed engaging and age-appropriate methods to introduce basic hitting mechanics, fielding techniques, and the principles of pitching. Agility and strength exercises were designed to enhance coordination and build a strong physical base.







As players progressed into the older age groups, the intensity and complexity of our training sessions increased accordingly. Hitting drills evolved to incorporate advanced techniques such as timing adjustments and pitch recognition, while fielding sessions emphasized positional play and defensive strategies suited to game situations. Pitching instruction became more refined, with a focus on developing a diverse repertoire of pitches and honing control and accuracy on the mound.

Throughout our time at D-Bat, agility and strength training remained a constant, with tailored workouts designed to improve speed, power, and overall athleticism. Whether players were 8U or over 15U, the emphasis on physical conditioning helped them unlock their full potential on the field.





Overall, our experience at D-Bat exemplified a commitment to comprehensive player development across all age groups. By providing a diverse array of training opportunities and personalized coaching, D-Bat empowered players of every age to excel in hitting, fielding, pitching, and overall athletic performance. ### From Planning and Codes

As the weather changes from the chill of winter and gives way to the warmth of spring, it's not just the flowers that begin to bloom – yards across the neighborhood come to life with new growth. However, with the thaw comes the inevitable task of spring yard cleanup. As a codes official with years of experience, I've seen firsthand the importance of proper yard waste management during this seasonal transition.

One of the primary concerns during spring cleanup is the disposal of yard waste. From fallen branches to dead leaves and excess foliage, yards accumulate a plethora of debris over the winter months. Improper disposal not only detracts from the aesthetics of our neighborhood but can also pose environmental hazards if left unattended.

To tackle this issue effectively, it's crucial for homeowners to familiarize themselves with local regulations regarding yard waste disposal. Our trash and recycling pickup is provided by Waste Management, and residents should follow their guidelines when disposing of yard waste. Yard waste must be bagged and fit inside the provided trash carts. If you have extra bags of waste that don't fit inside your cart, you may leave it alongside the cart ONLY on bulk pickup days at the end of the month. By adhering to these guidelines, homeowners can ensure their yard waste is disposed of responsibly, minimizing its impact on the environment.

Furthermore, composting presents an ecofriendly alternative for managing organic yard waste. Grass clippings, leaves, and other biodegradable materials can be composted to create nutrient-rich soil for gardening and landscaping projects. Compost not only reduces the burden on waste management systems but also promotes sustainable practices within the community. If you are planning to compost, it is best to follow these basic guidelines to **avoid attracting rodents.** 

- If using a compost bin, it is important to reinforce the bin with a lid and potentially a floor. There should be no gaps in your bin that are larger than 1/4 inch.
- Maintain the proper ratio of material in your compost: two to three parts carbonrich material (browns) to one part nitrogen rich material (greens).
- Ensure that you cover and bury your food scraps in your compost pile.
- **DO NOT** add meat, dairy, or greasy foods to your compost pile.

In addition to disposal methods, it's essential to address the issue of yard maintenance to prevent future accumulation of waste. Regular pruning of trees and shrubs can help minimize the buildup of dead branches and foliage, while proper lawn care techniques, such as mowing and aerating, promote healthy grass growth and reduce the need for extensive cleanup.

In conclusion, spring yard cleanup is not just a seasonal chore – it's a collective responsibility to preserve the beauty and sustainability of our neighborhoods. By adhering to regulations, exploring eco-friendly disposal options, and adopting proactive maintenance practices, homeowners can make a positive impact on their surroundings. As codes officials, we stand ready to support and guide our communities towards a cleaner, healthier future, one yard at a time.





### "THE REBELS ARE COMING!" - The Department of the Monongahela During the Gettysburg Campaign Monday, June 17 at 7:00 PM

Join us when Rich Condon of Civil War Pittsburgh discusses when President-Elect Abraham Lincoln visited the City of Pittsburgh in February 1861 and lauded this section of Pennsylvania as the "banner county of the Union" - a region where he imagined if the country were threatened its citizens would willingly pick up the shovel as well as the rifle. His vision came to fruition in June 1863 as an estimated 11,000 residents contributed to the construction of 37 earthen defenses around the city in anticipation of

a Confederate invasion. The U.S. War Department likewise sanctioned the creation of the Department of the Monongahela.

Rich Condon is a public historian from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania with a BA in public history from Shepherd University. For over a decade he has worked with a multitude of sites and organizations including The Battle of Franklin Trust, Soldiers & Sailors Memorial Hall and Museum, National Museum of Civil War Medicine, Harpers Ferry National Historical Park, Flight 93 National Memorial, Reconstruction Era National Historical Park, and Catoctin Mountain Park. Condon has written for Civil War Times Magazine, The American Battlefield Trust, as well as Emerging Civil War, and operates the Civil War Pittsburgh blog, which focuses on sharing stories related to western Pennsylvania's role in the Civil War.



### **Utility Construction**

Columbia Gas will be continuing utility work along Castle Shannon Boulevard this spring.

Work is planned to start along Castle Shannon Blvd then progress to Cooke Lane, Crystal Drive and Arlington Park. This project is tentative for a late March start date and will be completed in September.

Cooke Lane will be closed to through traffic for the duration of the bore. This will need to be a permanent closure for Columbia Gas's work. Access to the Rite Aid and the bank will be permitted. The plan will be to close Cooke Lane between the two entrances/exits to the Rite Aid parking lot. This work is estimated to take 3-5 weeks.

The work is expected to begin soon between 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday with Saturday and night work possible. Motorists can expect road closures and parking and lane restrictions during working hours only.

Please note, our crews will be working on Castle Shannon Blvd from 6 p.m.- 6 a.m. to minimize traffic restrictions. Adequate notices will be provided once we receive the dates the bore contractor is available.

The focus of the crews is to accomplish this work as quickly, efficiently, and safely as possible. We apologize for any inconvenience, and we appreciate your continued patience while we complete this important project to maintain safe and reliable natural gas service to homes and businesses in the community.

During this time, you may see our contractors or employees performing work and inspections on your street, public rights-of-ways and customers' properties and meters. You may also notice survey flags or stakes near your property. The purpose of these flags is to locate underground facilities before the project begins. This project may include replacing your service line and moving any indoor gas meters outside at no additional cost to you.

Your safety and the safety of our workers is our first priority. Please use extreme caution when traveling through our work zone. Please slow down and obey flaggers and all posted signs including detours and parking restrictions. We apologize for any inconvenience and will make every effort to limit traffic restrictions.

Our automated collection service will provide residents with a 96-gallon carts for trash and a 65-gallon cart for recycling. Cart delivery will take place between Wednesday, March 27th-Tuesday, April 2nd. Additional information packets will come with the new carts.

### **General Information**

Trash will be collected once every week. Recycling will be collected every other week. Despite our best efforts, we occasionally miss scheduled collections. If you believe you missed service, visit www.wm.com or callus at 1-800-866-4460.

Residents can also sign up for a My WM Account to conveniently report missed pickups.

### **Automated Trash Collection**

- Residents will receive a 96-gallon cart for automated trash collection.
   Cart delivery will take place between March 27th-April 2nd.
- Place your cart at the curb after 4:00 p.m. the night before your scheduled collection or by 6:00 a.m. on your service day.
- Bulk items will be collected once a month during the 4th full week of the month. Please reference the calendar for your 2024 bulk collection dates.
- Make sure there are at least three feet between your carts and any obstacles -mailboxes, parked cars or trees.

### **Automated Recycle Collection**

• Residents will receive a 65-gallon cart for automated recycling collection. Recycling carts will be delivered with trash carts during the Spring of 2024.

### **Bulk Items and Overflow Material**

- WM will only collect material that fits inside your trash and recycling containers. All trash must be bagged and fit inside the provided cart.
- Recyclables must be placed loose into your recycling cart and boxes must be broken down.
- Additional carts can be purchased for an annual fee of \$110 per year, with a 7% increase each year through the contract. To request an additional cart, residents must contact WM at 800-866-4460 and say "service change" or visit www.wm.com.
  - WM will collect two bulk items once per month during the 4th full week of the month at no additional charge. Place your bulk items at the curb on the same day as your trash collection during your bulk collection week. Bulk collection can be scheduled at www.wm.com.

Place clean and dry plastic bottles, jars and jugs, cans, paper and cardboard (break down your boxes) directly into your cart. One dirty item can contaminate an entire truckload, so make sure recyclables are clean and dry. Don't bag your recyclables. Keep plastic bags out of your recycling.
